- 3. Discussion regarding a theme for the play SWEAT:
 - a. <u>Themes suggestions</u>: Visibility, Collective Narratives, Intersectionality, American Dream.
 - b. Should we be explicit in the prompt questions for students regarding the election year; voter rights? Incoming first-year students will be adults; there parents are working adults and voter. This is an opportunity to educate students or at least being the discussion about voting.
 - i. Sabrina shared that reflecting on her first-year book and her goal for reading the book was from the perspective of transitioning to college. Therefore, it may be better to be explicit so students can review the play with the concept in mind about voting
 - c. We should consider giving the students a video snippet of the play along with the theme, mission and writing prompt that may help them gain a grasp of the many themes of the movie.

In the clip above, playwright Lynn Notage, mentioned 'towns' and during her interviews she noticed a common theme that the residents always referred to Reading, PA in the past tense, never in the present (has been, was, etc.). This concept of towns and personal narratives is relevant to the theme of invisibility:
 - 1. Every student has a narrative regarding where they grew u
 - 2. Gentrification
 - 3. Now students are coming to TCNJ their 'home' for four years (residents and commuters); what does it mean to live, grown, learn, at TCNJ; how do you fit in; are you invisible?, are there parts of you as a student that are invisible (intersectionality), how to intersect yourself into the culture of TCNJ?
- d. <u>TCNJ Mission Statement and Values</u> We should use this as a guide to help us build the theme and writing prompt (i.e. TCNJ values engagement, excellence, etc.
